At fall 2016 census, enrollment, FTES, and headcount are showing increases. Duplicated enrollment grew by 2.2\%, FTES increased by 4\%, and headcount increased by 7.6\%. Enrollment growth occurred primarily at local high schools, and online.

Enrollment by city was positive in Santa Maria, Orcutt, the Santa Ynez Valley. Three-year trends in the city of San Luis and northern San Luis County show a decline.

## Credit Enrollment

- Enrollment growth occurred in all ethnic groups. Enrollment among white students declined in fall 2015.
- There was significant growth in the under 20 age group; this trend includes recent high school grads and students in our concurrent enrollment program. Growth also occurred among the 35-54 age group, while the other groups remained relatively flat.

## K-12 Enrollment

- Enrollment from our top feederhigh schools increased because of a 6.9\% inc rease in exiting $12^{\text {th }}$ graders and $2.4 \%$ increase in the college going rates among high school graduates.
- 12th grade enrollments in the AHC District area are expected to be cyclical for the next three to four years.
