## **Textbook Survey**

This news letter presents data from a recent survey of AHC students regarding their experiences with textbook purchases and costs. Our survey results are consistent with national data indicating that students engage in efforts to mitigate textbook costs that are time consuming and lead to suboptimal outcomes. Furthermore, 60% of AHC respondents indicated that they were required to purchase a book that they did not actually use.

 1,038 students participated in a convenience survey administered through student emails and Canvas during fall 2017.


 82% indicated a goal to transfer or earn an AA degree (compared to 64% of enrolled students)





Data from the BLS show that since 1998, textbook prices have risen 181%






